National Clearinghouse for Science, Technology and the Law

This organization, housed at Stetson University College of Law and supported by a grant from the National Institute of Justice, is something you need to learn about. The Federal Lawyer carried an extensive article about it in its August 2005 issue, but here is a thumbnail sketch: NCSTL has a searchable online database of case law, journals, reports, and resources concerning law and science. It will be of particular interest to judges, lawyers, scientists, and law enforcement personnel who need to be up to date on legal challenges to scientific and technological matters such as fingerprints, tool marks, digital image enhancement, document examination, and trace evidence such as hairs and fibers. The "CSI Effect" has created unrealistic expectations on the part of juries, and this database can help bridge the gap between reality and what jurors see on TV. The database is accessible at www.ncstl.org, and it's free. There is a registration process which enables the saving and retrieving of past searches.
